The WFUNA Plenary Assembly,

Acknowledging that climate change is a global crisisⁱ that poses severe threats to the environment, human healthⁱⁱ, and social and economic stabilityⁱⁱⁱ;

Recalling that climate change disproportionately affects vulnerable communities^{iv}, including low-income populations, indigenous peoples^v, and marginalized groups, who often endure the most of its adverse impacts;

Reminding that addressing climate change requires urgent and comprehensive action at local, national^{vi}, and international^{vii} levels to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to its consequences;

Recognizing that SDG Goal 16 aims to achieve access to justice for all calling for non-discriminatory laws and policies for sustainable development - to ensure that the SDGs leave no one behind^{viii};

Emphasizing that all 17 SDGs in the UN 2030 Agenda for sustainable development should be addressed and implemented in a balanced manner to benefit both the people and planet;

Reaffirming that it is essential to prioritize climate policies^{ix} and initiatives that are equitable and just, ensuring that the burden of climate change mitigation and adaptation is shared fairly among all communities and states^x;

Recognizing UN Resolution A/RES/77/276^{xi} requesting the International Court of Justice to clarify the obligations on states to protect the climate system, and the legal consequences of failing to meet them;

Recalling that 45 countries, 3 regions and 1 city have made pledges to the Green Climate Fund, including 9 developing countries and the United States committing to contribute US\$ 2 billionxii;

Expressing serious concern that the goal of developed countries to mobilize jointly US\$100 billion per year by 2020 in the context of meaningful mitigation actions and transparency on implementation has not yet been met and urging developed countries to meet the goal;

Calls upon UN member states to take the following actions:

- 1. Focus on health disparities^{xiii} as a result of climate changes for marginalized communities and people,
- 2. Commit to prioritizing actions that reduce disparities and promote equitable access to resources, opportunities, and benefits related to climate change mitigation and adaptation,
- 3. Advocate for policies and initiatives at the regional, national and international levels that promote climate action and justice^{xiv},

Urges all United Nations' member states to support these measures to ensure climate justice, equitable policies and uphold the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
